

The legal victory means that for the time being, food trucks across Milwaukee can continue to serve customers until 1 a.m.

The ordinance, which had sparked heated debate among business owners, city officials, and residents, was intended to curb late-night activity in certain districts. However, food truck operators argued that such a restriction would unfairly target their livelihoods and strip the city of its vibrant late-night culture.

Following the issuance of the temporary restraining order, the legal battle is now set to continue in the courtroom. The judge scheduled a follow-up hearing for June, where both the city and the plaintiffs will have the opportunity to present arguments regarding the long-term validity and impact of the proposed curfew.

For now, the status quo remains. As the weather warms and foot traffic increases, Milwaukee's late-night food scene will continue to operate under its existing guidelines, providing service to residents and tourists well past midnight.

"We are relieved," said one local vendor following the news. "This gives us the chance to keep our business running and gives the court more time to look at the facts before any permanent changes are made."

City officials have not yet released a detailed statement regarding the court's decision, but the legal standoff is expected to remain a prominent issue leading up to the June hearing. Until a final ruling is reached, the lights on Milwaukee's food trucks will stay on until 1 a.m.
